

**NC STATE WAS FOUNDED
IN 1887 AS A LAND-GRANT COLLEGE.**

That means the school's focus was agriculture, science and engineering. This was in response to the Industrial Revolution — and the need for greater knowledge in those areas.

Nobody then could have imagined that the university would grow to over 2,000 acres and 8 million square feet of building space for more than 34,000 students. In fact, today we are the state's largest university.

At first, growth was slow. But after bringing in WWI and WWII veterans, NC State's student population grew exponentially.

Master plans were designed, but the school struggled to keep up with the demand for facilities and space for new departments and programs.

Today, NC State is thriving and innovative. Its Centennial and Biomedical Campuses are rich, collaborative environments for corporate, governmental and non-profit partners, as well as homes for programs in sustainability, solar energy, design and management.



NC State's focus on science, technology, engineering and math is the stuff of legends. The STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) Initiative provides funding for more than 100 projects, including research labs, statistical software, conference travel and sponsored visits by industry leaders.

We love the humanities, too. The English Department's fiction and poetry writing contests have doubled in just a few years, attracting entries from colleges and universities all over the state. It's a great tool to recruit talent for our successful MFA (Master of Fine Arts) program and shine the spotlight on the work of our talented students.

Fashion Development and Product Management, a concentration in Fashion and Textile Management, focuses on design and development of fashion products, from jeans to bridal gowns. Students use trend analysis, coloration, silhouette selection and other tactics to develop fashions that appeal to consumers. Talk about a good-looking curriculum!

Why do students say they always see someone they know on campus or in class? It's actually the students themselves. Everybody is open to meeting somebody. And there are so many campus events that bring students together.

With more than 500 student organizations and 40 different intramural and varsity sports teams, NC State really is its very own community. There are clubs for cooking, robotics, entrepreneurial pursuits, motorcycle racing, religion, philosophy, foreign languages; the list is long. Silly or serious, we know you'll find something that lights you up.

There's a robust Greek Community on campus to consider as well as student government, which holds a fall election for ten freshman senate seats. If you're a budding journalist, NC State has its own student-run radio and TV stations, WKNC 88.1 FM and WolfTV. There's also the long-standing student newspaper *Technician*, and *Windover*, an annual magazine featuring literary, visual and audio works.


Academics also play a key role in our organizations. There is the University Honors Program emphasizing academics and research, and the University Scholars Program focusing on scientific and political issues and the arts. While select incoming freshmen are invited to join these programs, all students may apply.



Doc Hendley founded Wine To Water after graduating from NC State and went to Darfur, Sudan to install water systems for victims of the government-supported genocide.

His dream to quench the thirst of the needy was recognized by CNN when he was selected as one of the top 10 "CNN Heros" in 2009.

Alex Martin, a senior at NC State, leads a volunteer effort to bring 21st century marketing tools to artists in the developing world.

He and other students created an eBay store for Beleza, a fair trade boutique in Raleigh that features handcrafted merchandise made by artists in 15 countries.

Beleza is owned by an NC State professor and his wife.



Each year more than 7,500 runners race from the Memorial Belltower to the Krispy Kreme in downtown Raleigh, eat a dozen donuts and then face a stuffed-beyond-happiness run back. The event raised more than \$120,000 for the North Carolina Children's Hospital last year.





Q. WHAT WERE YOUR BIGGEST CONCERNS ABOUT COMING TO NC STATE?


- A. “I was going to be really far from home and I knew I couldn’t go home on the weekend. And I didn’t know anybody. Those were the biggest things.”

Q. NC STATE IS SUCH A BIG UNIVERSITY; DO YOU EVER JUST FEEL LIKE A NUMBER?

- A. “The thing that surprised me the most is that I can walk around on a campus of more than 34,000 students and see lots of people I know every day.

It feels good to interact with people I know all the time. You don’t really think it’s going to happen but it does.”

Q. WHAT ABOUT IN YOUR CLASSES?

- A. “I’ve been in some of those big classes, but there are always labs or problem sessions that break it down.



RALEIGH, NC

DOWNTOWN RALEIGH IS JUST A MILE AWAY FROM CAMPUS.

We’ve got all the museums. The NC Museum of Natural Sciences is the largest of its kind in the Southeast. Next door is the NC Museum of History with exhibits like the interactive NC Sports Hall of Fame. The NC Museum of Art’s new West Building has been lauded by critics for its modern design and new additions.

You’ll also want to **check out the local food movement** here in Raleigh; it’s huge. There is never a shortage of restaurants serving fresh fish and shrimp from the coast and organic fruits and veggies from hundreds of local farms in the Piedmont.

We’re pretty “green” too. Folks ride bikes, walk and reuse bags for groceries. Raleigh is the first LEED-certified city in America (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) and local firm Cree (which started in an NC State lab) is a leading manufacturer of LED lighting.

Check out the Cree Shimmer Wall outside of the new Convention Center if you want to see a cool example of how the lights work artistically as well as efficiently.

Hopscotch is not a game here. It’s one of our most progressive and popular music festivals. And while you’re downtown, check out the awesome local music scene at clubs like **Kings** and **Slims** or touring acts at **Lincoln Theatre** and the **Raleigh Amphitheater**.

Nestled within the Warehouse district, the **Contemporary Art Museum (CAM)** is the only one of its kind in the state. CAM also partners with NC State’s College of Design to provide our students with a great place to explore the latest trends in art and design.

THE WEATHER

Our average temperature is a comfy 70 degrees; the low is 47. We might get a snowfall or two a year – *but that’s about it!*



Raleigh is centrally located to allow easy access to the coast, the mountains and major metropolitan hubs.

“I love the location. Downtown Raleigh is great. There are so many shops, restaurants and the club scene. It’s like a mile away. HOW TO APPLY

We call it wolfPAW »

As a major university known for its advances in technology, we can't be old-school when it comes to admissions.

So meet wolfPAW, your personal admissions website. If you're considering applying to NC State, you'll get to know the system well because it's how you start the process. Just fill out your information, submit everything online—and then check back as frequently as you like to keep tabs on your status.

FRESHMAN ADMISSION

» admissions.ncsu.edu/freshman

First things first. To start your career at NC State, you need to get accepted — and the competition is tough. In 2010, over 19,000 students applied for a freshman class of 4,550. The best candidates have excelled in a demanding college preparatory program, have scored competitively on standardized tests and have been involved in their school and community.

TRANSFER ADMISSION

» admissions.ncsu.edu/transfer

We welcome transfer students. More than 25 percent of our graduates started their college career at other institutions. Like freshman admission, transfer admission is also competitive. To be considered, students must meet the requirements and have 30 semester hours of transferable courses from an accredited community college or four-year university.

INTERNATIONAL ADMISSION

» admissions.ncsu.edu/international

The Office of Undergraduate Admissions considers you an international applicant if you are not a United States citizen or permanent resident (green card holder for more than one year). Application requirements vary for freshman and transfer applicants.

CREDIT FOR AP, IB OR COLLEGE COURSES

» admissions.ncsu.edu/placement

Each year, over 60 percent of our incoming freshmen will receive credit for such courses. Typically, students who score 3, 4 or 5 on AP exams can receive advanced placement and/or credit. NC State also recognizes the International Baccalaureate (IB) program. Students will be granted placement or credit on a course-by-course basis. If you've completed coursework at a college or university, you will be required to submit an official transcript for review.
